➢ GOLDEN MUSSEL PREVENTION at FOLSOM LAKE < Folsom Lake Marina

[The Folsom Lake Marina sent an email with this subject line to all slip renters on Monday April 7. A portion of that email is copied below for your information.]

As required by the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to help prevent the spread of the highly invasive golden mussel, effective April 14, 2025, all trailered or motorized vessel owners wishing to launch at Folsom Lake will be subject to an inspection, quarantine, or decontamination for Aquatic Invasive Species. The 30-day quarantine starts April 14th, 2025, when you will be required to follow all rules and regulations set forth by CA State Parks.

RACING RAG <</p>

TIME is going by so fast -- 5 days at Lake Tahoe last week, I forgot about drafting an article, then I got to the dry boat compound Saturday at Folsom Lake and found that my Main Halyard was laying on the tarmac. New subject matter -- something to write about.

Losing the halyard is like losing your car keys or wedding ring. Lots-o-splain'n to do. There is/are some things that are beyond our control, but losing a halyard is not one of them. If the mast is up, you have few options: drop the mast, climb the mast, or roll/heel the boat. I have done it the first way and the last way, but 450 pounds of keel weight, even retracted, makes heeling formidable.

A former FLYC member (name withheld) lost the halyard underway during the Cam Cup about 8 years ago while on a Santana 20. He chose to climb the mast resulting in exceeding the righting moment of the boat and going for a swim while holding on to the mast. On splashdown he released the mast, quickly righting the boat. OK so far, he then realized that to prevent his inflatable life jacket from going off automatically (pressure switch) he had to lay prone in the water. Try getting into a Santana without a ladder, while staying horizontal. His 1st boarding attempt – the squeal of CO2 and ripping Velcro was heard, inflating his lifejacket making it even more difficult. 3rd attempt found him in the boat cold and shaking, and no halyard. Back to the Subject: Fortunately, I was derigging the boat to take it home for spring cleaning prior to the Camillia Cup (scheduled for next weekend the 12th & 13th of April). In this world you must always secure the shackle to something. I prefer the mast ring for Whisker/Spinnaker-poles about shoulder height when standing on the roof of the cabin.

However, I might not be culpable for 'losing the halyard', as I am reminded of an incident while living in Hawaii where the halvards were secured properly, but the wire would go ding-ding against the mast. Sleepless residents next to the marina took matters into their own hands by releasing/losing the halvard, or in the case of beach catamarans, opening the drain plugs also, if anchored to a ball mooring. "My boat is stored near the road and there is a residence across the street."

How about them ACORNs in every nook and cranny. I found them in the base of the mast, under the secured boat cover, on the trailer, in the boom track, and about 40 of them in the access hole in the motor cover where one drains water from the carburetor bowl.

I have been crewing with Mike Fitzgerald (Fleet 4) for the 2nd and 3rd FLYC's Spring Series, and he is improving and enjoying the GAME. Mike related that last Saturday (4th Series) he was getting bold, trying a port start, had the angles, right on the timing only to have the other 5 boats **close the door** on him. Funny how that happens! I like his ATTITUDE! Nothing like getting away with a port start.

FLYC spring series is in the bag, and Mike Fitzgerald took second place with his Capri 22. Mike "FITZ" got his first BULLET in the 3rd race of the 3rd Spring Series. Mike did race committee for the first day – I crewed with him the 2nd & 3rd day, and he competed the fourth day. Showing up counts. He is getting the Capri 22 figured out --waiting for a new Jenny, then NO EXCUSSES! FLYC member Frank Chan, using the FLYC Club Boat, a Catalina 22, took first place for the Spring Series.

Upcoming races listed in order are the Camellia Cup next weekend (2 days) April 12-13, then the Trans-Folsom Race on April 26, which is a pursuit race where the higher handicapped boats start first, and the faster (lower handicap) boats start later. The Catalina 22 usually starts first with other boats starting up to 45+ minutes later. First to finish is the Winner.

This race has had many faces due to wind/weather variables causing shortened races, cold races, wet races, and knockdowns with ¹/₂" hail sliding down the mainsail into the cockpit. i.e. Be Prepared but Enjoy. This race takes the grand tour of the lake, going up both forks of the river and twice past the Dam, finishing at the Marina -- about 21 miles. On average, the race takes 3-4 hours, so bring food, water, sunscreen, patience, persistence, and a good compass. Navigation is important in this race -- bring binoculars or similar as the marks are far apart and easy to go around the wrong side. Or miss entirely.

On May the 7th is the first Beer Can Fun Race series. This is a Wednesday evening thing, taking advantage of the Delta Breeze on the hot days.

Starting Friday May 23rd is the first Summer Sunset Series with fleet races. Fleet racing is where several C22s are a fleet, placing against C22s, or by handicap against open keelboats (if too few boats).

The weekend of March 22-23 was mostly cloudy, but it didn't rain, so the First of Spring Cruise went ahead as planned. Unfortunately, my outboard is once again on the fritz, so I spent the whole weekend in my slip, trying to figure out what the problem was, and when I finally gave up, spent the rest of my time cleaning the boat and reading. The gas is brand new, so the problem is something else this time, maybe there's a plugged jet in the carburetor, despite there being 2 filters in the fuel line, or the ignition system has failed.

Pond elevation at Folsom Lake is currently 458', and the inflow is 7,000-10,000 cfs, so I have high hopes that the lake will fill to the brim over the next few weeks, and that we will have a good long boating season, maybe into October (keep your fingers crossed). The next event at Folsom Lake is the Camellia Cup Regatta on April 12-13, and I am planning to be out there, hopefully with my outboard running. Since the last couple of weeks since the weekend of March 22-23, have seen mostly cloudy and chilly weather, there are still very few boats in the marina, and no one else

besides me showed up for the skipper's meeting on the 23rd, so I am open to giving anyone who was interested in the First of Spring Cruise, but couldn't make it, a "rain check", and we'll have it April 12-13. If you are participating in the Cam Cup, just spend Friday and/or Saturday night on your boat, and we'll call it the "belated" First of Spring Cruise.

The next cruise after that will be Memorial Day weekend, May 24-26. I'll run a cruise at Folsom Lake, but if anyone would like to also run an "away" cruise somewhere - SF Bay or the Delta, maybe - just let me know.

We had good winds and were able to sail all the way back to Browns Ravine. We loaded the boat back onto the trailer and de-rigged in the parking lot, and lowered the mast and secured everything, and headed home after another great weekend of sailing on Folsom Lake.
